

Disruption

Dear Friends,

It was a wonderful experience visiting our sites at Lucknow, Bangalore and Mumbai. Very happy to see the projects in flow and the discussions I had with the team. Some important points emerged during the discussions including increased competition, improving efficiencies, cost optimisation etc.

Many times, one thinks he knows what is happening around in the industry based on current practices but often turns a blind eye to the disruptions happening.

Disruption is the game now. EPC business is no exception to this. The industry is moving with more innovative, efficient and sustainable practices.

Digital transformation through Building Information Modelling (BIM) facilitates collaborative planning and design with enhanced accuracy and efficiency helps project execution.

Automation and Robotics streamline construction processes and there by improve cost efficiency and also safety.

Offsite Modular construction such as Prefab techniques helps faster assembly and minimise disruptions.

Supply chain resilience is an important vehicle to improve efficiency of the organisation through digitisation and strategic partnerships. This mitigates disruptions and also helps in competing though efficient price mechanism.

These are only a few examples but there could be many more innovations happening. Especially many startups are working on new models which could play a pivotal role in the way EPC industry works.

Finally, I was impressed with a recommendation of Shiv Shivakumar, former Chairman PepsiCo India. The story of Dick Fosbury. He was an American high jumper. He went to his coach in the 1960s and said he would like to do the high jump with his back clearing the high jump bar. The coach did not stop him, and Dick went on to win the Gold in 1968 Mexico Olympic Games. To this day everyone uses the Fosbury Flop.

Taking the cue, I encourage you to think differently, and you will master disruption.

NCC Successfully Completes 5 MLD Eluru STP Project

NCC has successfully completed and commissioned the work of 5 MLD (Million Liters per Day) sewage treatment plant in the EPC mode for Eluru Municipal Corporation's Sewage and Septage Management project under the AMRUT (Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation) initiative.

The project aimed to enhance the sanitation infrastructure of Eluru by providing a robust sewage network and constructing a state-of-the-art 5 MLD Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) in Zone IV of the city.

Key Features of the STP Project:

Advanced STP Technology

The project includes a 5 MLD STP using advanced modern technology of Sequencing Batch Reactors for treatment. The STP consists of primary, secondary, and tertiary treatment units for efficient wastewater treatment.

Raw Sewage Receiving & Pumping System

Construction of a raw sewage receiving chamber at bed level +6.05 and a wet well cum pump house at bottom bed level +3.50, with plugging bottom level at +1.20 from the existing ground level of +12.60.

Installation of raw sewage pumps: 2 pumps of capacity 108cum/hr for lean flow (1/2 Dry Weather Flow), 2 pumps of capacity 216cum/hr for average flow (1 DWF) and 1 pump of capacity 540cum/hr for peak flow (2.5 times DWF).

Primary Treatment

An inlet chamber with a channel featuring two screens (1 mechanical + 1 manual) to filter out particles above 6mm.

A grit classifier to remove silt and heavy fine particles larger than 0.15mm.

Secondary Treatment - Sequencing Batch Reactor (SBR) Basins

Two SBR basins operate alternately in three phases: 1) Fill-Aeration, 2) Settle, and 3) Decant.

Key features of the SBR system include: Pre-react Zone, Buffer Zone, Automated Dissolved Oxygen (DO) control, Simultaneous Nitrification, Electro-mechanical decanter, Disc diffusers and air grid, SAS (Surplus Activated Sludge) pumps and PLC & SCADA-controlled operation for efficiency and automation.

Tertiary Treatment

Construction of a Chlorine Contact Tank (CCT) where biologically treated sewage from the SBR basins is disinfected before discharge.

Sludge Management

Excess sludge from the SBR basins is pumped to a sludge thickener for gravity thickening. Construction of a centrifuge building for further sludge processing.

Mechanical & Electrical Installations

Installation of three air blowers (100 HP, 1970m³/hr) with a 2-working, 1-standby configuration.

Construction of a 500 KVA transformer yard and provision of a 250 KVA diesel generator (DG) for backup power.

Administrative and Support Infrastructure

Construction of an administration building, laboratory, maintenance room, DG room, guard room, internal CC roads, and a compound wall spanning 500 meters.

The successful completion of 5MLD STP significantly enhances Eluru's wastewater management system, ensuring better sanitation and environmental sustainability for the city. NCC's commitment to high-quality infrastructure development continues to contribute to India's urban transformation goals.

Mega Water Supply Project in Hatadihi, Odisha



In a significant stride towards improving rural infrastructure and public health, NCC has successfully completed the Mega Integrated Rural Piped Water Supply Scheme to 200 Mining-Affected Villages of Hatadihi Block, Keonjhar District, Odisha. This ambitious initiative ensures sustainable and safe drinking water for over 1.73 lakh residents across 200 villages, transforming lives in some of the most mining-affected regions of the state.

The heart of the project lies in its scale and complexity, involving the construction of critical water infrastructure and laying an extensive pipeline network. Here's a snapshot of what was accomplished

Intake Well Construction at Bidhyadharpur Barrage: Completed with successful testing and commissioning.

Pipeline Network

- o Raw Water Raising Main: 8.517 km laid.


Community Engagement

Out of 200 villages, 161 villages physically verified and 100% water supply saturated; HGJ meetings conducted in 116 villages to ensure awareness and local ownership.

Additionally, the project included the construction of a Chemical House, Chlorination Building, Administrative Building, Staff Quarters, and a Sludge Handling System—ensuring operational readiness and sustainability.

A Model for Rural Transformation

By successfully executing this massive project, NCC reaffirms its commitment to nation-building and community well-being. The Hatadihi Water Project is more than a milestone—it is a lifeline to thousands, offering not just water but dignity, health, and hope.



Once a vision sketched on blueprints and maps, now it stands as a marvel carved into the heart of Telangana—a lifeline coursing through the dreams of millions. The Palamuru-Rangareddy Lift Irrigation Scheme (PRLIS), a monumental

initiative taken up by the Government of Telangana and executed by NCC Limited, has now become a symbol of engineering excellence and social commitment.

The objective was ambitious: to irrigate over 10 lakh acres of parched lands in the Palamuru, Rangareddy, and surrounding districts. As the scale and scope grew, so did the ambition—the targeted ayacut was proposed to be enhanced to 12.3 lakh acres, including provisions to supply drinking water to the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC) and fulfil industrial water needs. The source is the mighty Srisailam

Reservoir, with a mission to lift 120 TMC of water in just 60 flood days each year.

To make this a reality, water had to be lifted from an elevation of +269.730 meters at the foreshore of Srisailam, soaring against gravity to an elevation of +670.000 meters at Laxmidevipally Reservoir—the highest water level ever achieved by any irrigation project in Telangana. It wasn't just one reservoir or one pump house. The scheme was

divided into five critical stages of lifting and supported by six balancing reservoirs, each one a vital node in this hydraulic symphony.

The source is the mighty Srisailam Reservoir, with a mission to lift 120 TMC of water in just 60 flood days each year.

> The capacity of the Reservoir is 16.74 TMC and Maximum Height of Bund is 47.73m.

Among these engineering marvels stands the Venkatadri Reservoir—a shimmering expanse taking form in the quiet village of Vattem (V), nestled in Bijinepally Mandal, Nagarkurnool District. The capacity of the Reservoir is 16.74 TMC and Maximum Height of Bund is 47.73m. The entire Reservoir meticulously divided into 3 packages. Here, NCC undertook one prestigious Package-9 of PRLIS, with the responsibility to form the Venkatadri Reservoir Bund from Km 0.000 to Km 6.900. What once was barren land has now transformed into a massive waterholding structure, shaping the destiny of the region. With dedication, expertise and

precision, NCC has successfully completed our scope of work.

Working tirelessly through monsoons, scorching summers, and countless challenges, the engineers, workers, and project managers of NCC turned the impossible into a living, breathing reality. With every lift, every pump, and every cubic meter of earth moved, a promise was kept—to bring life to the land, hope to the farmers, and prosperity to the region.

Transforming Kabulpur

A Journey of Hope, Health, and Growth

Tucked away in the Barabanki district of Uttar Pradesh, about 50 kilometers from Lucknow, lies the modest village of Kabulpur—home to nearly households, predominantly economically weaker sections. Life in Kabulpur has always been rooted in resilience, but until recently, basic amenities like sanitation and proper school infrastructure remained distant dreams. In a determined move to change this narrative. NCC Limited embarked on a mission in 2023-24 to foster inclusive development in this underserved region. What began as a commitment to build bathrooms-cum-toilets-each equipped with overhead water tankssoon evolved into a broader story of transformation.

A Toilet for Every Home

For many families in Kabulpur, access to clean and private sanitation had long been a challenge. In the first phase, 300 units were constructed in homes that previously lacked these essential facilities. The work didn't stop there. In 2024-25, an additional 115 units were added, bringing dignity and hygiene into the daily lives of more families. As Kabulpur is blessed with ample groundwater, water access was not a hurdle—making these sanitation units both functional and sustainable. Looking ahead, 35 more households have been identified, and by the end of 2025-26, NCC aims to ensure that every home in Kabulpur is equipped with its own bathroom and toilet, moving the village closer to being Open Defecation Free.

A School Reimagined

Alongside sanitation, education took centre stage in NCC's vision for holistic village development. The local middle school—a key pillar of the community—was in dire need of repair. Renovation work began earnestly, with classrooms getting a fresh look, new flooring being laid, and separate toilets being constructed for boys and girls.

By March 2025, the school's transformation was already halfway through, with a noticeable impact:

student attendance began rising, particularly among girls who now had access to proper sanitation facilities. The school, once a dilapidated structure, is gradually becoming a vibrant learning environment, with the promise of improved academic outcomes and renewed enthusiasm among children and teachers alike.

Changing Lives, One Step at a Time

The impact of NCC's development work in Kabulpur extends far beyond bricks and mortar.

- Health & Hygiene: The presence of sanitation facilities is expected to drastically reduce waterborne diseases and foster healthier hygiene habits among children and adults alike.
- Empowering Women & Girls: Access to private toilets enhances dignity, safety, and comfort for women and girls, enabling them to participate more freely in school and community life.
- Community Pride: The visible changes have sparked a sense of pride and ownership among residents. Families are more engaged, more hopeful, and more unified in their aspirations.
- Future Possibilities: A well-maintained school and basic infrastructure create the groundwork for economic opportunities—whether through education, small businesses, or local employment.

A Vision for the Future

The work is still ongoing, but the dream is clear. Over the next 3 to 4 years, NCC envisions Kabulpur as not only a model for sanitation and education but also a beacon of 100% literacy and empowerment. What began as an infrastructure initiative is now shaping into a movement—fuelled by compassion, commitment, and community spirit. Kabulpur's story is a validation of what is possible when we build not just structures, but futures.

Child Nutrition with Mid-Day Meal Van Donations



GAM GANTAM DORA THE WARRIOR

Gam Gantam Dora was a valiant tribal leader who played a crucial role in India's freedom struggle against British colonial rule. Deep dedication to tribal welfare brought him into direct conflict with the colonial authorities, who retaliated by seizing his home. Refusing to be subdued, he became an active participant in the Rampa Rebellion (1922–1924), standing shoulder to shoulder with Alluri Sitarama Raju and Mallu Dora in the fight for India's freedom. Even after the fall of Alluri Sitarama Raju, he remained steadfast in his resistance—until he was ultimately slain in Valasampeta village, Singadhara. Despite his heroic contributions, generations of his descendants remained marginalized, caught between the loss of their ancestral lands and the absence of modern infrastructure. They endured a life of hardship, residing in makeshift huts that barely shielded them from nature's fury.

A CULTURE ROOTED IN RESISTANCE AND RESILIENCE

The tribals of Lanka Veedhi Village have a rich cultural heritage, deeply connected to nature and traditions passed down through generations. Their folklore still echoes the bravery of Gam Gantam Dora, and their songs narrate tales of resistance against the British Raj. For decades, they remained on the fringes of development, with limited access to education, healthcare, and modern amenities. Yet, their unwavering spirit, much like their heroic ancestor, never faded. The transition from thatched huts to modern housing is not just a shift in living conditions but a long-overdue recognition of their contributions to India's history.

A VISION REALIZED: DR. AVS RAJU'S PROMISE

During the 125th Birth Anniversary celebration of Alluri Sitarama Raju, organized by the Kshatriya Seva Samithi, Dr. AVS Raju was deeply moved by the plight of the tribal descendants of Gam Gantam Dora. Felicitated at the event by the Hon'ble President of India, Smt. Droupadi Murmu, he pledged to provide permanent homes for these families. What began as a heartfelt commitment has now materialized into a life-changing reality.

A HISTORIC TRANSFORMATION: FROM HUTS TO HOMES

After years of struggle and advocacy, as part of CSR activity, NCC Limited has now provided these families with wellbuilt 2-bedroom flats, a historic move that marks the first-ever residential flats constructed in the Tribal Agency Area. These flats, comprising two residential blocks (G+2), provide each family with a 700 sq. ft. unit featuring two bedrooms, a hall, a kitchen, and attached bathrooms. The flats, built at a cost of Rs 2.5 crore, were handed over to the tribal villagers on 17 February 2025. The project, part of a broader initiative to uplift tribal communities, ensures that these homes come equipped with proper sanitation, electricity, and access to essential facilities.

As a special tribute to the legacy of the tribal freedom movement, the occasion also witnessed the unveiling of a statue of Alluri Sitarama Raju in the same

premises—symbolizing the indomitable spirit of resistance that both he and Gam Gantam Dora embodied. The statue stands tall as a beacon of pride, heritage, and remembrance, reinforcing the connection between past sacrifices and present-day progress.

For the tribal villagers, these homes symbolize more than just shelter—they represent dignity, security, and justice after a century of neglect. The elders in the community see this as a tribute to Gam Gantam Dora's vision of an empowered and self-sufficient tribal society. The younger generation, now with access to skill development and better living conditions, carries forward the dreams of their ancestors, stepping into a future where they no longer have to fight for basic rights but can aspire for greater opportunities.

HONOURING A HERO'S LEGACY



books; their legacy will continue to thrive in the homes built for them, ensuring that the dignity and security their great leader fought for remain a reality.

TRIBUTE TO ALLURI SITARAMA RAJU THE BEACON OF REBELLION

Alluri Sitarama Raju was a legendary freedom fighter who inspired countless revolutionaries, including Gam Gantam Dora, to take up arms against British oppression. Born in 1897 as Alluri Rama Raju, he prefixed the name "Sita" in memory of a girl whom he loved during his youth and whose untimely demise at a young age left him heartbroken. He dedicated his life to the cause of tribal welfare, justice, and independence. With his charismatic leadership and deep understanding of guerrilla warfare, Alluri Sitarama Raju orchestrated a series of daring attacks on British police stations, capturing arms to empower the tribal

forces. A hallmark of these raids had been that after each attack, Rama Raju would sign a written note in the station's diary, giving details of the plunder there. complete with the weaponry he acquired, date and time of his attack, and dare the police to 'stop him if they can'. Despite relentless pursuit by British forces, he never wavered in his mission. His unwavering commitment to the nation made him a symbol of resistance, earning him immense respect and admiration among the tribal communities. To end the rebellion and to capture Alluri Sitarama Raju, the then district collectors: Bracken of East Godavari and R.T. Rutherford of Visakhapatnam, employed all means possible, both fair and foul, from burning villages to destroying crops, killing cattle and violating women, all to no avail. After putting up a massive effort for nearly two years, he was ultimately captured in 1924 at Koyyuru and killed, but his legacy of courage, sacrifice, and patriotism continues to inspire generations.

Tribute to Manyam Hero Gam Gantam Dora

Manyam Hero, Gam Gantam Dora, was a valiant freedom fighter and a revered tribal leader who played a crucial role in India's struggle for independence against British colonial rule. Hailing from Battapanuka village, he belonged to the Bhagatha tribe and was widely known for his kind-hearted nature and unwavering commitment to tribal welfare.

However, his dedication to the upliftment of tribal communities put him at odds with the oppressive British authorities. In a brutal act of retaliation, the British colonial rulers forcibly confiscated his lands, cattle, and even his home in Lanka Veedhi Village, citing the so-called tribal laws of that era. This injustice only strengthened his resolve. Standing shoulder to shoulder with Alluri Sitarama Raju and Mallu Dora, he played a pivotal role, leading attacks on British police

stations to seize firearms and ammunition for the tribal rebel forces. As a trusted lieutenant and right-hand man of Alluri Sitarama Raju, Gam Gantam Dora's strategic prowess and fearless leadership were instrumental in sustaining the rebellion. He continued the fight against British rule until June 7, 1924, when he ultimately met his end in Valasampeta village, Singadhara. Out of his deep love and respect for Alluri Sitarama Raju, he was laid to rest in a From Thatched Huts

memorial built adjacent to the monument of Alluri Sitarama Raju at Krishnadevi Peta. His courage, resilience, and dedication to the cause of India's freedom will forever be remembered as a beacon of inspiration for future generations.





Noon Chai - Kashmiri pink tea with green tea, salt, and milk.


Sulemani Chai – Black tea with lemon and honey.
